#### (1) Power of One Anti-Bullying Program

To improve the learning and academic performance of all students in all PPS

The Superintendent of Schools recommends and I so move, adoption of the following:

### RESOLUTION

The Plainfield Board of Education is committed to ensuring that all students succeed academically and reach their full potential in life. In so doing, it is also committed to providing opportunities for and ensuring that all students meet the New Jersey Core Curriculum Content Standards and achieve academic and life-long success.

To increase students' awareness of the dangers of harassment, intimidation, and bullying, Charles H. Stillman School will offer a program through a series of plays presented by The Power of One Anti-Bullying Program. The facilitator has expertise in providing quality instruction via demonstration on topics that deal with harassment, intimidation and bullying. It teaches bystanders to report bullying all of forms, therefore, decreasing the probability of bullying in schools utilizing skits that illustrate physical abuse, exclusion and cyber bullying to approximately three hundred-thirty (330) students in grades K-5.

The Power of One Anti-Bullying Program of New Jersey has agreed to present an exciting assembly that will help students understand that bullying is not just a school issue, but one that impacts all areas of their lives and their communities as well. After the presentations, the students will take an anti-bullying oath. A large poster board of the oath will be given to the school for the students to sign and display in the school for all the students to read. Two (2) assemblies will occur on October 31, 2013 at 8:45 AM and 9:30 AM at a cost not to exceed \$785.00.

The Jefferson School Third Grade, consisting of eighty-two (82) students along with five (5) staff members and four (4) additional chaperones will go to the Reeves-Reed Arboretum in Summit, New Jersey. Two (2) classes will attend Friday, October 25, 2013, and two (2) classes will attend, Friday, November 1, 2013.

There is no cost for admission or transportation. Admission and transportation costs are covered by the Arboretum and its partner, Novartis Pharmaceuticals. Camptown Bus Company will transport Jefferson School participants.

The trip will meet the science Core Content Standards NJCCS 5.3.4.A.1 where all students will learn about wildlife habitats, changing leaves, seed dispersal, the parts of plants we eat, and New Jersey's native animals. This is aligned with our unit of study in life science.

The Evergreen School 4<sup>th</sup> Grade class consisting of fifty (50) students along with six (6) staff members will visit The Metropolitan Museum of Art, in New York City, located between 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue and 82<sup>nd</sup> Street, Friday, November 22, 2013.

Departure is scheduled for 8:15 AM and returning at 3:00 PM.

There is no cost for admission, the cost of transportation is \$935.00 and will be provided by Raritan Valley Bus Service. The total cost of this fieldtrip will not exceed \$935.00.

The trip will meet the reading and writing core content standards 4W1 and 4L10, and the performing arts standards 1.1.2. D.1, 1.1.2.B.4, 1.2.2 A.1, 1.3.3 D.2, 1.4.1AB; where all students will understand proper social interaction in a non-restrictive environment. They will have the pleasure of enjoying a guided tour throughout parts of the museum, and be instructed in various artistic and musical activities.

This field trip will also provide Evergreen Elementary School students with experiences that cannot be duplicated in school. The field trip is an integral part of instruction and is an incentive for students to continue their educational experience. Upon returning the students will participate in educational activities that will enhance them academically as well as socially and emotionally.

The Teen Healthy Project is an evidence-based teen pregnancy prevention program that serves adolescents between the ages of 12-17 in Elizabeth, Plainfield, and Roselle. The project emphasizes behavioral skills development, community outreach, contraceptive education and access, healthy life choices, HIV/AIDS, and self-esteem accompanied with parental component and peer led community activities.

The availability of funds has been verified and will be charged to 12-000-421999-0000-00-0000 (District Capital Outlay Projects).

**K. Toilet Room Waiver**

The Superintendent of Schools recommends, and I so move, adoption of the following:

**RESOLUTION**

**WHEREAS**, room 108 at Evergreen School and room 206 at Jefferson School do not have an individual toilet room inside the classroom and,

**WHEREAS**, New Jersey Administrative Code 6A:26-6.3 (h) 4ii allows for providing an individual toilet room adjacent to or outside a kindergarten classroom if certain criteria are satisfactorily addressed, and

**WHEREAS**, the District desires to use this alternate method of compliance, now therefore be it

**RESOLVED**, that the Plainfield Board of Education approves the use of alternate toilet facilities for the 2013-14 school year at both Cook and Jefferson Schools and authorizes the submission of the District's waiver form to the County Superintendent of Schools.
