A **BUSINESS** Meeting of the Board of Education of the City of Plainfield was held this day in the Plainfield High School, auditorium. Notice had been provided to Board members and to the Courier-News, Star Ledger, Public Library, City Clerk, Plainfield Police Department, and posted in all Plainfield Public Schools and the District's website. The meeting was called to order at 6:30 p.m. by Ms. Yolanda Henry, Assistant Business Administrator, and the following action took place:

The Plainfield Board of Education resumed the public session of its Business Meeting at 8:15 p.m.

#### IV. REMARKS FROM THE BOARD PRESIDENT

Mrs. Hernandez remarks were to honor and recognize our Teachers for such loyalty and fine job they contributed for so many years.

Mrs. Campbell commented on the teachers as well and commended them on a fine job. She wants to introduce film series to help solve the many issues facing our district such as i.e. Race to Nowhere, Waiting for Superman and Don't Fail Me Now, just to name a few. She would like to collaborate with all stakeholders and provide an open forum for all to participate in resolving our challenges.

#### V. REMARKS FROM THE INTERIM SUPERINTENDENT

Mrs. Belin-Pyles highlighted a few events going on in the District:

- Reminder that we will be having a Spelling Bee
- Plainfield on Stage- Wonderful Site to behold (this is the 1<sup>st</sup> round)
- Meet with Cook School
- 

She mentioned that we needed to reflect for a moment and continue to review the School Redesign / Restructuring areas (grade 6<sup>th</sup>). She wants to promote and enhance the quality of instructional education and all elementary school configurations. Decisions have NOT been made concerning the configuration of class size, avail courses, and the capacity of Bldg.

Mrs. Belin-Pyles will meet with the Hubbard and Maxson community to revisit the reconstruction Plan on Thursday, May 19<sup>th</sup>. This plan must be voted up or down and submitted to the Dept. of Education by next week. Therefore, during this meet, we need to get everyone/stakeholder's ideas, comments and feedback so that this data can be used for sound decisions.

Mrs. Belin-Pyles decided to pull items D1 and D2 on pages 41 and 42 which pertained to the Restructuring of Hubbard and Maxson and will seek out additional input from our stakeholders which will happen on this Thursday, May 19<sup>th</sup>.

#### VI. PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR

Mr. Kwame Asante, PASA president, stated he hopes to collaborate with board in the negotiating process.

Mr. Mark Williams, Stillman principal, read letter from PASA Executive board.

A number of teachers from Washington school expressed their support of Mr. Kwame Asante, Principal at Washington School.

Maria Pellum inquired about the staff evaluation process and if tenured and non-tenured staff could be identified on the agenda. She also inquired about the middle school restructuring plan.

Mary Sayers expressed concern about Cook School students going to the middle schools.

Students from Cook School expressed their concern with space at Cook.

Cheryl Nagy Smiley expressed concern that the middle school was getting a bad reputation. She noted that Hubbard School is the safest school under the direction of principal, Gwynetta Joe. It is a uniform school, meaning all students wear their uniforms and no gang activity is present.

#### VII. REMARKS FROM COMMITTEE CHAIRPERSONS

Mrs. Gilbert stated that maybe we should not support the media (Courier News, etc.) if the paper continues to project negative images of Plainfield.

HR/ Personnel:

Vice President Campbell motioned the HR/Personnel as a consent exclude p.7 and Mr. Edache seconded and the roll call was conducted and results indicated that the motioned carried.

Ms. Barksdale interjected to notify Mrs. Hernandez that we were not following the agenda and that we were still on the remarks of the committee and delegate reports and not yet on the section requiring any actions.

Mrs. Hernandez proceeded to address the section that was missed. Mr. Hurtt then proceeded to give his report. He attended a meeting with the NJ School Boards and there were two pressing issues regarding the approval of Charter School by a vote of the community and Tenure-suspend pay ultimately give district a cost reduction.

Ms. Barksdale gave praise to the Clinton family for their Career Day and their Fundraiser for the Japan Relief Fund. They collected approx. \$400.00.

Mr. Abdul-Haqq attended a PTO and SLC meeting held at Plainfield High School to determine which way is up and that we should be learning from one another.

Mrs. Hernandez has assigned Mr. Dorien Hurtt as the School Liaison to Barlow/Evergreen and Stillman was assigned to Mr. Alex Edache and Cook was assigned to Ms. Surgeon.

The C & I Agenda was motioned by Ms. Barksdale as a consent agenda with the exception of D1 and D2 from p. 41, 42 which was pulled from Interim Superintendent. Also, on page 33 an item was pulled due to the fact that board members weren't comfortable with the travel and the amount.
